HISTORY

(HIST – B.A., 124 Credits)

A history major prepares students for a broad array of careers in fields that value research experience, analytical skill, and the ability to write well. History is the oldest liberal arts discipline and retains its value today in forming versatile, well-rounded individuals with the core skills needed to adapt to a rapidly changing world.

History majors at Penn State Behrend build a solid foundation in the broad sweep of American, European, non-Western history and anthropology through introductory survey courses in their first years of study. After mastering the basics, students proceed to more specialized advanced courses in which they study a specific topic or period in depth and conduct their own historical research.

The History program stresses both traditional and innovative methods of research, including the analysis of written records, material artifacts, and visual culture. Majors are encouraged to think critically, explore the fundamental determinants of human behavior, develop effective research and writing skills, and to apply digital tools and resources to study the past.

In addition to coursework, the history program offers opportunities for students to complete original research projects or gain hands-on public history experience by interning with a history-related institution. As an encouragement to student research, the best research paper is rewarded every academic year with the history program's Undergraduate Research Award.

For those who are drawn to history but choose to major in another field, an eighteen credit history minor is available. Since several of the courses for the minor also fulfill General Education requirements, it is relatively easy to design a course of study in history that will be a useful and enriching complement to a degree in another discipline.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

A major in history provides students with excellent preparation for admission to professional schools and the pursuit of careers in any field where research experience, analytical skills, and good writing are important. Penn State Behrend history graduates have found employment in business, education, law, industry, pastoral ministry, state and local government, law enforcement, library and museum management, the military, and information technology.

HISTORY REQUIREMENTS (36 credits)

History majors at Penn State Behrend must achieve an overall grade-point average of at least 2.0 and a C grade or better in all 300/400-level courses within the Prescribed, Additional and Supporting categories of the major. Students who receive grades below C in 300/400-level courses must repeat the courses or take school-approved alternatives, earning grades of C or better.

PRESCRIBED SURVEY COURSES (12 credits)

Select 4 from HIST 001, HIST 002, HIST 010, HIST 011, HIST 020 and HIST 021. Three credits must come from HIST 001 or HIST 010.
